Plot
Does the plot grab your attention from the start?
Is it engaging and original, or predictable and clichéd?
Character Development
Are the characters well-developed and relatable?
Do the characters change and grow throughout the story?
Writing Style
Is the writing clear and engaging?
Does the author's unique style and voice enhance the storytelling?
Themes
Are the themes of the book clear?
Do the themes provoke thought and discussion?
Pacing
Does the story move at a good page?
Is it too slow or too fast?
Conflict and Resolution
Is the conflict well-described?
Is the resolution satisfying and believable?
Setting
 Is the setting well-described?
Does the setting add to the atmosphere of the story?

Dialogue
Is the dialogue natural and believable?
Does the dialogue add depth to the characters?
Originality
Does the book offer something new or unique, or is it a rather familiar story?
Overall Enjoyment
Did you enjoy reading the book?
Would you recommend this book to others?

What are you supposed to do with this?

With this checklist, you should have a solid foundation through which to start reviewing your books in a smarter and more organized manner.

The questions are to be used as triggers to your mind in order to systematically lead you to a rating result for your book.

This, however, does not mean that you should just take this system and stick to it. Tailor it to every book individually but most importantly do not forget it to tailor it to yourself. This is a system to get you started.
